## **One Hundred Fifth Annual Report, 2024**

### **CPME Mission and Goals**

The Council on Podiatric Medical Education (Council or CPME) is an autonomous, professional accrediting agency that evaluates and accredits educational institutions and programs in the specialized field of podiatric medicine. CPME is designated by the American Podiatric Medical Association to serve as the accrediting agency for podiatric medical education.

### **CPME Mission**

The mission of the Council is to promote the quality of graduate education, postgraduate education, certification, and continuing education. By confirming these programs meet established standards and requirements, the Council serves to protect the public, podiatric medical students, and doctors of podiatric medicine.

To achieve its mission, CPME has adopted and prioritized the following objectives:

1. Assure and enhance the quality of the educational outcome at all levels in podiatric medicine.
2. Assure and enhance the quality of the educational process at all levels in podiatric medicine.
3. Maintain compliance with the criteria for recognition established by the U.S. Secretary of Education and the Council for Higher Education Accreditation.
4. Regulate compliance with standards, requirements, and criteria established by CPME.
5. Establish and maintain good lines of communication with the community of interest.
6. Be responsive to innovative concepts in podiatric medical education and training.
7. Review and resolve complaints received about colleges, providers of continuing education, residency and fellowship program sponsors, and specialty boards.
8. Seek out ways to improve upon the quality and methods of the CPME evaluation processes.
9. Participate in the national discussion on issues concerning accreditation, including, but not limited to, maintaining membership in the Association of Specialized and Professional Accreditors.

### **Guiding Principles**

The success of CPME is based on the following guiding principles. A commitment to:

- the CPME mission,
- the engagement in continuous quality improvement and learning,
- the contribution of CPME to the profession, and

- the cultivation and support of an environment that demonstrates commitment to diversity, equity, and inclusion within its member institutions, board and staff, representatives, and all who are served by these groups.

CPME welcomes, embraces, and respects diversity of people, identities, abilities, and cultures.

## **CPME Meetings**

### **Spring 2024**

The Council on Podiatric Medical Education (CPME or Council) held its spring meeting April 20<sup>th</sup> at APMA Headquarters in Rockville, MD. The recommendations emanating from Council committees, which completed their deliberations at meetings and conference calls held from February - April, constitute the majority of each CPME agenda and include the review of reports from the colleges of podiatric medicine. The Specialty Board Recognition Committee (SBRC) met in February, and the Continuing Education Committee (CEC), Residency Review Committee (RRC), and the Collaborative Residency Evaluator Committee (CREC) all held meetings in March. The Accreditation Committee and the Council's Budget Planning and Executive Committees held their meetings April 18-19.

### **Fall 2024**

The Council on Podiatric Medical Education (CPME or Council) held its fall meeting on October 18-19, 2024, in San Diego, CA. The recommendations emanating from Council committees, which completed their deliberations at meetings and conference calls held from September–October, constitute the majority of each CPME agenda and include the review of annual reports and progress reports from the colleges of podiatric medicine. The Continuing Education Committee and the Residency Review Committee held their meetings in September and the Accreditation Committee, Budget Planning and Executive Committees met in October.

## **CPME Officers and Elections**

At the April meeting, the Council elected its officers to be effective at the close of the Council's October 2024 meeting: Dr. JT Marcoux was reelected chair and Dr. Alyssa Stephenson was reelected vice chair.

John T. Marcoux, DPM is the Residency Program Director at Beth Israel Deaconess Medical Center in Boston, MA.

Alyssa Stephenson, DPM is a podiatrist at the Carl T. Hayden Veterans Affairs Medical Center in Phoenix, AZ. Dr. Stephenson serves as a college site visit evaluator and as chair of the Continuing Education Committee and the Specialty Board Recognition Committee.

Elections to the Council were conducted at the October 2024 meeting. Dr. Sean Grambart was elected for a three-year term as an at-large and educator member of the Council. Dr. Robert Joseph was elected to serve a second three-year term as an at-large and academic/practitioner

member of the Council, Dr. Alyssa Stephenson was elected to serve a third three-year term as an at-large and practitioner member of the Council, and Dr. Susan Stapleton was elected to serve a third three-year term as the postsecondary educator on the Council.

Sean Grambart, DPM is the Assistant Dean of Clinical Affairs and the Research Director at the Des Moines University College of Podiatric Medicine and Surgery in West Des Moines, Iowa. Dr. Grambart was appointed to the Accreditation Committee at the Council's October 2024 meeting.

Robert Joseph, DPM, PhD is the Program Director, Podiatric Medicine and Surgery Residency with Reconstructive Rearfoot/Ankle Surgery (PMSR/RRA) program at the North Florida South Georgia VA Healthcare System in Gainesville, Florida. Dr. Joseph previously served as a member of the Accreditation Committee and was appointed at the Council's October 2024 meeting to serve on the Residency Review Committee. In addition, Dr. Joseph serves as a college and residency evaluator.

Alyssa Stephenson, DPM is a podiatrist at the Carl T. Hayden Veterans Affairs Medical Center in Phoenix, Arizona. Dr. Stephenson serves as a college and residency site visit evaluator and as chair of the Continuing Education Committee and the Specialty Board Recognition Committee. Dr. Stephenson also serves as the vice-chair of the Council.

Susan Stapleton, PhD is a research professor in the Department of Chemistry at Western Michigan University in Kalamazoo, Michigan. Dr. Stapleton currently serves as a member of the Accreditation Committee and as a college evaluator.

### **Continuing Education Committee**

Fall 2024: The Committee reviewed the current continuing education members and terms and

welcomed Ms. Lara Beer-Caulfield (new ASPE representative) and Ms. Kerry Simm (new provider representative) to the Committee. The Committee thanked Ms. Ridolfo and Dr. Mason for their service.

### **Residency Review Committee**

Spring 2024: Sonia Mvuemba, DPM was appointed as a COTH representative to the Residency Review Committee. Dr. Mvuemba is the residency program director at University Hospital in Newark, NJ and an on-site evaluator. Dr. Mvuemba's first term began August 1, 2024.

Fall 2024: Dr. Steven Vyce was reappointed to the Residency Review Committee (RRC) as the CPME representative and as the Committee Chair. Dr. Danae Lowell was appointed to her second term on the Residency Review Committee as an at-large member. Dr. Michael Vaardahl was appointed to his second term on the Residency Review Committee as a member representing the American Board of Foot and Ankle Surgery (ABFAS). Dr. Robert Joseph, who previously served on the Council's Accreditation Committee, was appointed to the Residency Review Committee.

## **GENERAL UPDATES**

### **Fee Schedule Updates**

The CPME approved a change to the residency and fellowship program fee schedule to apply a \$500 fee if a program must submit a second progress report, after the initial team report response, to come into compliance with the standards and requirements. The program may be placed on probation following the review of the second progress report and the \$500 fee will continue to be applied for each progress report submitted until all issues have been fully corrected and full approval is granted (i.e., approval with no report), or the program's approval status is withdrawn. This fee will be applied beginning with the CPME action letters sent out following the spring 2025 RRC and CPME meetings.

Concerning continuing education providers, a \$500 progress report fee will be applied if a provider must submit a third progress report to come into compliance with the standards and requirements. The \$500 fee will continue to be applied for each progress report submitted until all issues have been fully corrected and full approval is granted (i.e., approval with no report), or the provider's approval status is withdrawn. For continuing education on-site visits or reverse on-sites, a fee of \$4,000 will be applied. Providers will be billed for any additional costs over \$4,000 following the on-site visit or the reverse on-site. Fees will be applied beginning with the CPME action letters sent out following the spring 2025 CEC and CPME meetings.

The Council reserves the right to waive the residency or fellowship program or continuing education provider progress report fees in extenuating circumstances.

The CPME determined that institutions requesting appeals of adverse actions will be billed \$10,000 prior to the appeal. Institutions are billed for any additional costs over \$10,000 following the appeal.

**Milestones Pilot Project:** At the April 2023 CPME meeting, the Council voted to create a Milestones Pilot Project. Led by a committee of experts in competency-based education, the Milestones Pilot Project Committee is responsible for creating a supplemental guide and training webinar for the podiatric milestones. Once this material has been created, these resources will be posted on the CPME website along with the milestones for optional use by residency programs.

During the Council's April 2024 meeting, the Council discussed the Milestones Pilot Project. The Council determined that the creation of the milestones and the supplemental guide will continue, but the pilot project will be placed on hold. Instead, residency programs will be able to access and use the milestones as a resource for their residents. During this trial period, CPME will survey residency programs to gather information as to the benefits and pitfalls of using the milestones.

The Milestones Committee met six times in 2024 and completed the work of the Milestones and the Supplemental Guide. The draft document will be presented to the CPME at its May 3, 2025, meeting.

### **Release of the CPME Conflicts of Interest List**

The CPME was asked to review its conflict of interest policy and to consider releasing the conflicts of interest of Council members to the public. The Council discussed this topic at its spring 2024 meeting and determined that a survey of other accreditors was in order. Sixty accreditors were surveyed during summer 2024 and with a 60% response rate, the survey results and comments were reviewed by the Council at their October 2024 meeting. The survey results showed that no other accreditor releases the conflicts of interest of its Council or committee members to the public as all accreditors must have and follow stringent rules concerning conflicts of interest and how those conflicts are handled. Due to rigorous internal controls concerning Council and committee member conflicts of interest, leading up to a meeting, during a meeting, and following a meeting, the Council determined that the conflicts of interest list will not be made public.

### **CPME Publication Updates:**

#### **CPME Publications 120 and 130 (Colleges of Podiatric Medicine)**

The Council on Podiatric Medical Education has begun the required rewrite process of CPME 120, *Standards and Requirements for Accrediting Colleges of Podiatric Medicine* and CPME 130, *Procedures for Accrediting Colleges of Podiatric Medicine*. Per the CPME Bylaws, the review of these documents will be led by an Ad Hoc Advisory Committee comprised of members representing organizations within the community of interest and will begin in 2025. As part of the document review process, CPME surveys the community of interest to obtain the opinions of the podiatric community of interest regarding crucial elements of these college documents.

A survey was disseminated to the community of interest on November 8, 2024, with a closing date of January 15, 2025. The Council is in the process of appointing the ad hoc advisory

committee who will review the survey results and begin the rewrite process in 2025.

### **CPME Publications 220 and 230 (Specialty Board Recognition Committee)**

In March 2021, the APMA House of Delegates approved a resolution moving the Joint Committee on the Recognition of Specialty Boards (JCRSB) to become a standing committee of the Council on Podiatric Medical Education. Subsequently, CPME adopted Bylaw amendments at its October 2021 and April 2022 meetings in order to comply with the APMA action. The Bylaw revisions included moving the JCRSB to a standing committee of the Council and restructuring the JCRSB representation.

To reflect that the JCRSB is now a standing committee of the Council, CPME changed the name of the JCRSB to the Specialty Board Recognition Committee (SBRC). Further, as part of this process, the underlying JCRSB/SBRC documents (CPME 220, *Criteria and Guidelines for Recognition of a Specialty Board for Podiatric Medical Practice*, and CPME 230, *Procedures for Recognition of a Specialty Board for Podiatric Medical Practice*) must be updated to reflect the new CPME/SBRC Bylaw revisions.

The review of these documents was led by an Ad Hoc Advisory Committee, which began their review in fall 2022. This committee met 13 times over the course of a year and a half. The ad hoc committee submitted Draft I of CPME 220 and 230 along with an accompanying SBRC Eligibility Requirements Application and Initial Recognition Application (CPME 209a and 209b) and a Subspecialty Certification Proposal (CPME 209c) to the Council on Podiatric Medical Education in April 2024. CPME approved Draft I of CPME 220, CPME 230, and CPME209a-c at a special meeting held on May 13, 2024, and determined that the revised documents would be disseminated to the community of interest for a period of 60 days.

At the Council's October 2024 meeting, the Council reviewed the survey results and letters submitted by the community of interest concerning Draft I of CPME 220, *Criteria and Guidelines for Recognition of a Specialty Board for Podiatric Medical Practice*, and CPME 230, *Procedures for Recognition of a Specialty Board for Podiatric Medical Practice*. Due to the volume of comments submitted, the Council will continue their review of the comments before determining next steps.

### **CPME 720 and CPME 730 Documents Adopted – Continuing Education Providers**

Following a call for comment period from the community of interest, CPME has adopted the revisions to CPME 720, *Standards and Requirements for Approval of Providers of Continuing Education in Podiatric Medicine* and CPME 730, *Procedures for Approval of Providers of Continuing Education in Podiatric Medicine*. The revised documents will go into effect July 1, 2025.

Staff are currently working to finalize the documents for distribution and expect to have these documents disseminated and posted to the CPME website in the coming weeks. ## Colleges of Podiatric Medicine

The Accreditation Committee is responsible for recommending to the Council candidacy of new and accreditation of existing colleges leading to the professional degree in podiatric medicine. The Committee reviews evaluation reports, progress reports, and other information submitted by the institutions within its review area.

The Council took the following accreditation actions at its 2024 meetings:

### April 2024 Meeting

CPME took the following accreditation actions at its April 2024 meeting:

**Samuel Merritt University College of Podiatric Medicine** – At its April 2024 meeting, the CPME voted to change the accreditation status of the Samuel Merritt University College of Podiatric Medicine from accreditation with monitoring to accreditation as the college is in compliance with all accreditation standards and requirements.

**Temple University School of Podiatric Medicine** – At its April 2024 meeting, the CPME voted to change the accreditation status of the Temple University School of Podiatric Medicine from accreditation with monitoring to accreditation as the college is in compliance with all accreditation standards and requirements.

**University of Texas Rio Grande Valley School of Podiatric Medicine** – At its April 2024 meeting, the Council elected, based on an on-site evaluation, to continue the school’s candidacy status for one additional year.

Based on review of the comprehensive report of the onsite evaluation team, the school’s written response to the team report, and the school’s presentation to the Accreditation Committee on April 18, 2024, the Council did not grant preaccreditation and instead determined that candidacy will extend for one additional year as there are substantial noncompliance issues that the Committee and Council determined could be resolved within a relatively limited period of time. Note that candidate status may extend for no longer than three years (initially granted June 2022). The Committee and Council determined that a focused site visit should be scheduled. This will allow the school to demonstrate progress with the issues identified during the onsite visit, the posting of the Part I APMLE scores, and the build out of the newly acquired physical space. The school may admit students for the fall 2024 semester as progress has been demonstrated. A focused on-site evaluation to assess progress and compliance with the CPME accreditation standards was conducted on January 6, 2025. The maximum first-year class enrollment for the school is 40.

**Western University of Health Sciences College of Podiatric Medicine** – At its April 2024 meeting, the Council elected, based on an on-site evaluation, to extend accreditation through April 2032. The college is in compliance with all accreditation standards and requirements.

### **October 2024 Meeting**

CPME took the following accreditation actions at its October 2024 meeting:

- **Arizona College of Podiatric Medicine at Midwestern University** – At its October 2024 meeting, the CPME voted to change the accreditation status of the Arizona College of Podiatric Medicine at Midwestern University from accreditation with monitoring to **accreditation** as the college is in compliance with all accreditation standards and requirements.
- **Barry University School of Podiatric Medicine** – At its October 2024 meeting, the CPME elected, based on an on-site evaluation, to change the accreditation status of the Barry University School of Podiatric Medicine to **accreditation with monitoring** and extend accreditation through October 2029. The college is in noncompliance with Standard 1B Strategic Planning; Standard 1D Ongoing Evaluation Process; Standards 2B Relationship with Parent Institution, 3B Chief Academic Officer, and 6F Organization; and Standard 5B Faculty Size.
- **Des Moines University College of Podiatric Medicine and Surgery** – At its October 2024 meeting, the CPME elected, based on a focused evaluation site visit, to **approve the substantive change in location** request from the Des Moines University College of Podiatric Medicine and Surgery.

### **College On-Site Visits 2024**

- The focused site visit to assess the substantive change in location of the Des Moines University College of Podiatric Medicine and Surgery in West Des Moines, Iowa took place on April 29, 2024.
- The scheduled reaccreditation on-site evaluation of the Barry University School of Podiatric Medicine in Miami Shores, Florida took place June 3-6, 2024.
- The scheduled reaccreditation on-site evaluation of the Kent State University College of Podiatric Medicine in Independence, Ohio took place September 23-26, 2024.
- The on-site visit to determine preaccreditation of the Lake Erie College of Osteopathic Medicine (LECOM) School of Podiatric Medicine in Lake Erie, Pennsylvania took place November 4-7, 2024.



## **Residency Programs**

The RRC is a collaborative effort of CPME-recognized specialty boards, the Council of Teaching Hospitals of the American Association of Colleges of Podiatric Medicine, and CPME. The Committee reviews, takes actions on, and makes recommendations concerning podiatric residency programs in accordance with procedures and requirements set forth by the Council. The RRC meets semi-annually to deliberate and recommend approval of residency programs.

Residency actions taken during 2024 RRC and CPME meetings, and through e-ballots and conference calls can be found at [cpme.org/residencies/approval-actions](https://cpme.org/residencies/approval-actions).

During 2024, the Council and RRC conducted virtual and on-site evaluations of 46 new and approved residency and fellowship programs. As of December 2024, the Council had authorized 609 first-year residency positions.

## **Continuing Education Providers**

The CEC is responsible for reviewing applications for approval of new providers, petitions for continuing approval, evaluation reports, progress reports, and other information submitted by the providers within its review area. The Council approves providers of continuing education that demonstrate and maintain compliance with the standards and requirements identified in CPME 720, *Standards and Requirements for Approval of Providers of Continuing Education in Podiatric Medicine*. Approval is based on programmatic evaluation and periodic review by the Council and the Committee. The primary purpose of approval is to promote and ensure high-quality education and continuous improvement in educational programs. Approval also ensures the quality of continuing education programs to the public, the podiatric medical profession, and state boards for examination and licensure.

As of December 2024, the Council has approved 59 providers of continuing education in podiatric medicine.

## **Fellowships**

The RRC is a collaborative effort of CPME-recognized specialty boards, the Council of Teaching Hospitals of the American Association of Colleges of Podiatric Medicine, and CPME. The Committee reviews, takes actions on, and makes recommendations concerning podiatric fellowship programs, in addition to residency programs, in accordance with procedures and requirements set forth by the Council. The RRC meets semi-annually to deliberate and recommend approval of fellowship programs.

Fellowship actions taken during 2024 RRC and CPME meetings, and through e-ballots and conference calls can be found at [cpme.org/residencies/approval-actions](https://cpme.org/residencies/approval-actions).

During 2024, the Council and RRC conducted virtual on-site evaluations of 3 new and approved fellowship programs. As of December 2024, the Council had authorized 34 first-year fellowship positions at 20 CPME approved fellowships.

## **Specialty Boards**

As delegated by the Council, the SBRC is responsible for recommending to the Council the granting of new and continuing recognition to specialty boards in podiatric medicine. The SBRC reviews applications, annual reports, petitions for continued recognition, progress reports, and other information submitted by the specialty boards within its review area. The SBRC may recommend to the Council minor or emergency modifications in policies, standards, requirements, and procedures and recommend to the responsible ad hoc advisory committee modification of policies, standards, requirements, and procedures relative to the areas of responsibility of the SBRC.

Certification processes are identified for podiatric surgery and podiatric medicine and orthopedics. The Council recognizes the American Board of Foot and Ankle Surgery (ABFAS) and the American Board of Podiatric Medicine (ABPM).

During its February 24, 2024, meeting the SBRC conducted a review of the annual reports submitted by ABFAS and ABPM.

## **Collaborative Residency Evaluator Committee**

CREC held an Evaluator Training Workshop for new and existing evaluators on May 4, 2024.

The committee met on December 7, 2024, in Fort Lauderdale, FL, for its annual winter meeting. The Committee reviewed content and agenda for new evaluator training as well as program director and coordinator training taking place on Saturday, May 10, 2025, in Chicago, IL.

## **Department of Education**

The Council holds recognition as the accrediting body for first professional degree programs in podiatric medicine from the Secretary of the US Department of Education (USDE), appearing on the list of nationally recognized accrediting agencies that the US Secretary of Education identifies as reliable authorities concerning the quality of education offered by educational institutions or programs. The Council has appeared on the Secretary's list since the recognition process was first legislated in 1952.

CPME submitted a petition for continued recognition in 2021. The USDE staff and the National Advisory Committee on Institutional Quality and Integrity both recommended renewing CPME's recognition for continued recognition in 2022 for five years with no deficiencies. In spring 2022, CPME received official notice from the Secretary of Education that CPME's recognition by the USDE was renewed for five years. The next petition for continued recognition is due in early 2025.

## Council on Higher Education Accreditation

CPME holds recognition from the Council on Higher Education Accreditation (CHEA) as the specialized/professional accrediting agency for colleges of podiatric medicine, first professional degree of Doctor of Podiatric Medicine, and the pre-accreditation category of candidate status for developing colleges, schools, and programs of podiatric medicine.

The next comprehensive CHEA recognition review is scheduled for 2025.

## Association of Specialized and Professional Accreditors

The Council is a charter member of the Association of Specialized and Professional Accreditors (ASPA), which was established in 1993 as an umbrella organization to represent the interests of specialized accreditation. ASPA’s mission is to communicate the value of specialized and professional higher education accreditation and promote quality by facilitating discussion among and providing educational opportunities for programmatic accreditors.
